7. Description

The Erie Armory is a large, two story brick building executed in the Colonial Revival Style. The eastern section of the building was constructed in 1920. In 1929 the building was extended to the west more than doubling its size. It is sited on a corner lot within the City of Erie. The large administration section of the armory sits beside the drill hall forming a rectangular shaped building. The armory has good integrity.

The walls, which are constructed of brick in a common bond, along with some decorative coursing, form a 7 bay by 10 bay armory. There is a concrete foundation and the administration section has a flat roof while the drill hall has a gable roof. Both roofs are surrounded by a crenellated parapet wall that has stone coping. The openings in the building vary in size and window type. The large vertical openings in the drill hall are filled with glass block while the administration section has one over one double hung windows. The main entrance, which is located at the end of the administration section, consists of a set of double doors recessed behind a compound segmental arch with a smooth stone face. The entry bay is further accented by an inscribed stone plaque above the arch. A similar entrance is located at the end of the drill hall. Other entries into the building are located along the side of the drill hall. These entrances are marked by a carved stone surround and the wooden double doors are recessed behind a segmental arch.

The interior of the building has plaster walls and ceilings with tile floors. The painted woodwork is limited and is very simple in style. The drill floor has a wood floor and an open ceiling while the basement has a concrete floor.

The integrity of the armory is good. On the exterior the original wood double hung windows in the drill hall have been replaced with glass block. The wood administration entrance doors have been replaced with glass and aluminum doors. On the interior of the building some new walls have been added in the basement, first and second floors of the administration section. Panelling and dropped ceilings have also been installed in some instances. The plan has remained intact. The drill hall is still distinct even though rooms have been added in one end. It is spanned by a two-hinged arch truss system with the primary part of the arch being a crescent truss of steel.

8. Significance

The Erie Armory is significant under criteria A and C. It is a member of the State Armory Building property type under the multiple property nomination, Pennsylvania National Guard Armories. It was built for four units of the 112th Infantry of the Pennsylvania National Guard in 1920. The second half of the building was completed in 1929. The building was designed by Joseph F. Kuntz at the W.G. Wilkins company of Pittsburgh. Kuntz is responsible for the design of at least 18 armories in the western third of Pennsylvania. The Wilkins Company began designing armories in Pennsylvania just after the State Armory Board's creation in 1905. Some of the typical spaces in the armory include a drill hall, a kitchen and dining area, a locker room, classrooms and offices. The drill hall's two-hinged truss system is representative of early twentieth century wide span roof system and makes the Erie Armory also significant in the area of engineering.
